The King's Coronation

It was great to be able to mark the Coronation of King Charles III with a parish wide event, held on Monday 8th May 2023.

Threatening skies and sombre forecasts were held at bay with the Woughton on the Green microclimate winning through to ensure a dry day for us all.

Folk music, swing dance, and the sound of the church bells filled the air. The whole place came alive as people started to arrive along the tree lined driveway decorated with bunting and flags. It was nice to see neighbours, friends and family gathering together in the historic setting of the hotel grounds and adjoining St Mary's Church.

Judging by the 20 pints of milk, 175 jam and cream scones, dozens of homemade cakes that were enjoyed and the long queues to ring the church bells, we think around 200 people attended across the day.

The Big Help Out was a new addition with a focus on opportunities to volunteer with local groups and activities. Information and sign up sheets were dotted around to allow residents to find out more about how to get involved.

Quite a number of people signed up for the scouts, canal volunteers, and the bell ringers. One or two added their names to the litter picking and the Woughton Heritage group. Some groups were equally able to raise their profile and awareness of what's available and what is needed in our area. For example, I was fascinated to learn about the Blind Readers service, with active volunteers in our Parish.

Jubilee Trees

It was last May, just over a year ago, that the belated delivery of trees for the Queen's green canopy was made. Ask any gardener and they will tell you that you should plant trees when they are dormant in Autumn or early Spring. The parish was presented with quite mature tree specimens that were in full leaf and in one case in blossom at the start of what many would call a drought, by English standards! That is not to say that we aren't grateful for being given these trees.

The circumstances required groups of volunteers to help with the movement of the trees to the planting locations and then digging the holes, positioning the trees and staking them. In some ways that was just the beginning as the prolonged dry spell required these newly planted trees to be constantly watered by volunteer residents that had the pleasure of living close to the planting locations. Watering bags were supplied with the trees. Once filled these drip water slowly to the roots.

It is pleasing to see that all the trees have survived and are looking good. The early May rains avoided any thoughts of tree watering, but the recent dry spell has got everybody nervously reaching

Around and About

Er, what? ERLASS!

After several years of beavering away on the devolved landscaping agenda, we have become quite familiar with technical terms in the Highways Department.

One such is ERLASS, strictly an acronym standing for Estaterelated Landscape and Street Services. This turns out to be important, because included within it is responsibility for local footpaths, which are not formally Highway for maintenance purposes. They are particularly apparent when new estates are developed and before the final footpaths are adopted as routes around development.

In the parish, it turns out we have quite a few of them on Passmore, Woughton Park and Baskerfield Grove/Goodman Gardens estates and OWPC has had very mixed success in trying to progress maintenance requests on them and now we know why: they're treated by MK City Council as temporary. You will recognise them immediately and probably use them regularly:



The good news is that having joined up these dots we have now been successful in persuading MKCC to address their condition.

30 MILE CYCLE CHALLENGE

New for the summer, the Parks Trust has produced a route for cyclists taking in some of MK's loveliest open spaces and several sections of Old Woughton feature – obviously! From the map you can see that the circuit loops south from Willen Lake down through the Ouzel Valley Park to Caldecote Lake then north via the towpath to Furzton Lake and back to Willen. You can join or leave at any point, so let us know how you get on!



TOWPATH CODE

Ease off the pedal power and stay safe

Some individuals are simply cycling too fast and need to slow down or someone will be hurt. Towpaths are shared spaces and pedestrians have priority.

If you're cycling, you must go slow enough to mind and give way to other people, and to be able to stop safely if you need to. If you're in a hurry, you need to take a different route away from the canal.

On the towpath, ease off the pedal power, enjoy the slow ride and make sure the canal can be enjoyed safely by everyone.

MK Marathon 2023

The weather was again good for the runners, neither raining nor being too hot. The men's course record, set last year, was not beaten this time round, with the winning time this year being 2 hours 30 minutes and 30 seconds, 54 seconds slower than last year. The route of the course did change this year, hence the runners going right through the parish from south to north along the length of Newport Road, so direct comparisons may not be entirely accurate.

The women's race was won in a time of 2 hours 53 minutes and 56 seconds. As with the men it was close to the course record, missing that target by 1 minute and 14 seconds.

The main action point in the parish was at the end of Baskerfield Grove where there was a water station and toilets for the runners. The organisers cleared up all the discarded cups very rapidly once all the runners had made their second trip round the loop that included Newport Road.

The marathon relay was won by a mixed team with the very apt name of "Kenya Run As Fast As Us" Their time was 39 seconds slower than the men's marathon winner, but a course record for the marathon relay. The half marathon was won in a time of 1 hour 14 minutes and 1 second for the men and 1 hour 23 minutes and 24 seconds for the women. Neither time close to the course record for the half marathon.

The annual MK event is consistently ranked in the top 10 UK marathons. It is an AIMS (Association of International Marathons and distance races) certified race and has BARR (British Association of Road Races) Gold accreditation for outstanding race management.

Runners can use it as a qualifying event for London and Boston marathons as well as an Abbott World Marathon Majors Wanda Age Group World Championships qualifier. It is also an England Masters qualifying race.
